Our school will communicate with you and provide learning activities for your child to do at home, using our normal communication methods such as the school website, Skoolbag, Facebook, newsletters and emails.






Parent responsibilities during remote learning

Provide support for your children by:

- establishing routines and expectations
- defining a space for your child to work in
- monitoring communications from teachers
- · beginning and ending each day with a check in
- taking an active role in helping your children process their learning
- encouraging physical activity
- checking in with your child to help them manage stress
- monitoring how much time your child spends online
- keeping your children social, yet set rules around their social media interactions.





Student responsibilities during remote learning



Adjust these according to the age of your child:

- following a daily routine for learning
- identifying a safe, comfortable, quiet space for learning
- regularly monitoring communications from teachers
- doing their best work
- doing their best to meet timelines and commitments
- communicating with their teacher to seek help as different needs arise
- complying with the department's <u>student use of</u> <u>digital devices and online services policy</u>



Establishing routines and expectations

Support your child by:

- establishing routines and expectations from the start
- encouraging your child to follow the class timetable
- encouraging regular breaks and regular movement breaks
- keeping normal bedtime routines

Setting up a learning environment

Support your child by creating a space that:

- is quiet and comfortable
- is in a public / family space (not in a bedroom)
- has an adult present who can monitor your child's learning

Learning environment checklist

In setting up this space the following should	
be considered:	
	Is the area free of distraction?
	Is there excessive noise in the area?
	Are there trip hazards in the area?
	Is the area exposed to direct glare or reflections?
	Does the area have sufficient power points available?
	Is equipment (extension cords etc.) in good, safe, working condition?
	Is there a proper desk and chair and other necessary equipment (light, stationery and devices)?
	Is the chair adjusted correctly?
	 Feet should be flat on the floor and knees bent at right angles with thighs parallel to the floor.
	 The chair backrest should support the lower back and allow your child to sit upright.
	 The chair should move freely and not be restricted by hazards such as mats and power cords.
	 Chair arm rests should be removed or lowered when typing.
	Is the computer adjusted correctly?
	 The screen should be positioned directly in front of your child.
	 The screen should be at a distance where your child can see clearly and easily without straining. The top of the screen should be slightly lower than eye level.
	 The keyboard should be positioned at a distance where elbows are close to your child's body and their shoulders should be relaxed.




Tips for looking after your children during learning from home include:

- talking about what is happening
- helping your child to think about how they have coped with difficult situations in the past and reassuring them they will cope with this situation too
- exercising regularly
- encouraging children to keep in touch with family members and friends via telephone or email



Communicating with the school



Your child can communicate with the teacher through the Google Classroom learning management system.

Parent communications with the school are via the existing platforms of email or telephone call to the school.

It is important that parents are mindful that teachers are communicating with dozens of students and as such parent communications sent through the children's classroom will not be responded to.



Student communications with teachers

Teachers will be communicating with students within the Google Classroom learning management system.

Teachers will have set times for communications, and these will vary day to day.

Digital citizenship
